ANNUAL TRINITY CAMPOUT 2025 - is scheduled for July 25 - 27 at the Ward property near Donnelly. Save the date! Whether you have an RV, tent, or plan to sleep in a hammock - or at your own place in Valley County - or in a local motel - or just plan to drive up for the day......you are welcome to join us for as much of the event as fits your schedule. Each year, people invite friends and family who do not attend Trinity; we love having quests.

LOVE OFFERING - Speaking of **CAMPOUT**, our "**love-offering**" this year will be similar but different.....similar in that we are showering our love on a library (Donnelly Public Library this time)......different in that we won't be giving them

books. This library has just over 1000 sq ft of floor space and, with the 2024 legislation requiring separation of adults' and children's materials, they have moved their children's programs outdoors into several teepees. They have a robust after school program plus a wonderful summer program planned. When asked what we could do to support them, the library director said "healthy snacks" would be a godsend!

We hope to help provide snacks for the after school and summer children's programs. We would like to be able to offer snacks that the kids will like but are on the healthier side of things. There are many options to choose from at our local stores whether it's a grocery store, Costco, or a specialty market.

The basic requirements are that the snacks are individually wrapped in a snack size portion, they need to be "shelf stable" (does not require refrigeration) with a "use by" date that extends six or more months. The categories are Cookies, Crackers, Chips, Fruit, Nuts/Seeds, and Miscellaneous. Some healthy ideas are:

fruit snacks or roll-ups made with real fruit or juice *instead of gummy bears*

popcorn instead of chips

crackers with peanut butter or cheese instead of plain crackers

graham crackers instead of cookies

dried fruit like raisins or cranberries

small portion sizes instead of large bags. Think of things that you might buy for a lunch box.

Tami Robinson (our nutrition expert) found prices ranging from 25 to 75 cents per individual portion. It depends on what's on sale, different name brands, and the season. It's almost as much fun shopping as doing a scavenger hunt! **HINT** - this is **not** the time to clear your pantry of pudding and applesauce that expired in 2013!!

The library's other need is more floor space; it is raising money to add this space. We will collect a **monetary offering** for the library's building fund at the CampOut worship service on 7/26.

2025 - TRINITY'S YEAR OF GRATITUDE

with our 2025 theme of gratitude, please watch for a NEW little library in the narthex bookshelf. We have 5 books on gratitude that we'd love to have you borrow, read, and return. Follow the instructions on the little clipboard and enjoy! Here's what we have to offer (at the moment - we plan to add more selections as the year continues)....

GRATEFUL by Diana Butler Bass. This book was studied by our Tuesday afternoon group. It covers our individual emotions and ethics around gratitude plus how we as a community can experience gratitude together. Every day there are reasons NOT to feel grateful.....so thoughts and acts of gratitude are a sort of defiance, an alternative to anger and fear. They show hope in the face of evil, and lead to a more abundant experience of living.


I WANT TO THANK YOU (How a Year of Gratitude Can Bring Joy and Meaning in a Disconnected World) by Gina Hamadey. The author challenged herself to write 365 thank-you letters in a year, separating the months into different categories. Follow the humor and grace of her journey and pick up some ideas you could use. If writing notes is not your thing, there are many ways to express gratitude.

MAKING GRATEFUL KIDS (The Science of Building Character) by Jeffrey Froh and Giacomo Bono. This is research-based guidance on ways to instill gratitude early in life. Kind of like a free wonder-drug with zero ill side-effects.

THANKS A THOUSAND (A Gratitude Journey) by A. J. Jacobs (from TED Books). A simple "thank you" to the barista when he picked up his morning coffee led the author to thank the literally thousands of people who contributed to this coffee......from farmers and shippers and buyers to the guy who invented the lid with the little hole so he could smell the coffee as he drank it, the creator of the jacket that kept him from burning his hand, and the chemist at the reservoir that supplied his city's water. A fun book that expands your mind and

makes you grateful for all the people who supply things that we all take for granted.

THE GRATITUDE DIARIES (How a Year Looking on the Bright Side Can Transform Your Life) by Janice Kaplan. Another year-long journey, separated into seasons and sub-topics, by the former editor of Parade magazine. She shares the stories, successes and short-fallings of her journey, with some very specific guidance including a 7-day gratitude challenge.

TUESDAY STUDY GROUP



PSALMS on Tuesdays from 2:00 pm – 4:00 pm. The Tuesday Study Group is finishing our exploration of other

religions and how Christians can interact and interact with them. On February 11th at 2:00 pm we began our new focus on the psalms. Each participant brings his/her own favorite translation of the Bible (perhaps Vicar Aaron will bring his Hebrew version?!) and we will study the different genre of the psalms. It is generally accepted that they group into the following categories: Lament (of the community and of individuals); Specialized Lament (penitential and imprecatory); Thanksgiving (of the community and the individual); Specialized Thanksgiving (salvation history and songs of trust); Hymnic Psalms (hymns and doxologies); Liturgical Psalms for Public Worship (covenant songs, royal/enthronement songs, songs of Zion, and temple liturgies); and Community/Wisdom Psalms. If you have an interest in the psalms, or an interest in a study group - this would be a good time to join us. If your schedule has you out of town frequently, this would be an ideal topic for you - each week's lesson is self-contained, and you won't feel lost if you miss a week or two. Please consider joining us in the Koinonia (blue) room on Tuesdays between 2:00 - 4:00 pm as we trek through the psalms together.
